

FAGCA FOUNDING

When did it all start?

In 1905, the State of West Virginia issued a charter to The Fenton Art Glass Company to manufacture glass. Seventy-two years later, the State of Wisconsin chartered The Fenton Art Glass Collectors of America, Inc., as a non-profit corporation. Its principal office was located in Appleton, Wisconsin, A year earlier, in 1976, Otis and Ferill Jeane Rice, joined by eight charter members, had formed the Fenton Finders of Wisconsin. This club became the first local chapter of the FAGCA. By 1988, the national organization had grown to twenty local chapters. Over 13,000 people have been involved in the FAGCA.

FAGCA FACTS

Where?

The FAGCA is an association dedicated to learning more about Fenton glass, but it is not controlled or sponsored by The Fenton Art Glass Company. For the first eight years its operations were based in Wisconsin. In 1984 the office of this non-profit, educational, collector's society was moved to Williamstown, West Virginia.

Who?

FAGCA is run by a 9 member Board of Trustees elected by the membership and two permanent members (the founders). The officers are elected annually by the Board of Trustees. The corporation has a not-for-profit, tax-exempt status under Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code. Gifts made to FAGCA may be deducted under present IRS regulations.

Any person may become a member by filling out the application blank printed on page 3 and paying the annual dues of \$20.00. Associate memberships are available to other members of the same household for \$5.00 each.

What happens at convention time?

The collectors (members) enjoy an annual convention usually the first week in August. The convention is held in Williamstown, West Virginia and near-by Parkersburg. This weeklong gala includes a private guided tour of the Fenton factory, seminars, special sales and a lot of friendship. The culmination is a banquet and auction of unusual glass created especially for the FAGCA members.

How does one learn about old glass, new glass, other members?

The "Butterfly Net", the newsletter of FAGCA, is mailed to each member six times a year. This publication includes informative articles on Fenton glass and special advertising listings by FAGCA members showing items wanted or for sale. It also shows color pages of rare Fenton Art Glass.






