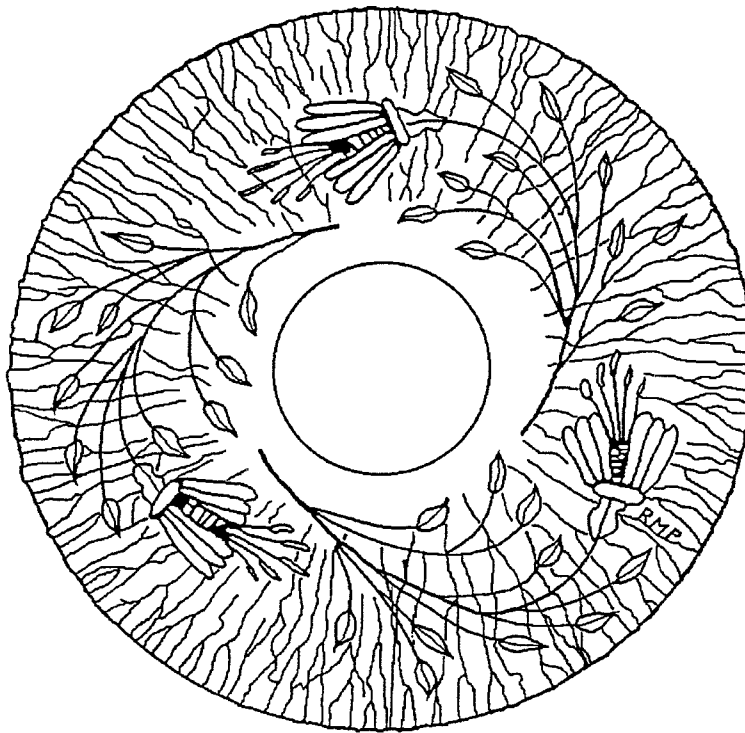

(Co-)PRESIDENTS' MESSAGE

Dear Members:

Gee, where did the summer go! Since our last letter we have not been far from Ohio but we have been successful in finding some nice pieces of stretch glass. We're always amazed that few new pieces spring up but with diligent searching, there are good ones to be found.

With this newsletter, we are enclosing a newly revised edition of our "Constitution and By-Laws" You will also find a new membership form which can be copied, front to back and cut into four pieces. We hope that you will take the time and effort to make some copies and leave them at your favorite antique mall or show. We know that there are many stretch glass collectors who are still unaware of our organization.

We also hope that you will be able to use the new figures for many of the Northwood line. We have about exhausted our examples and hope to see more at the

next convention. As the Northwood line was illustrated, we soon began to realize that there are numbers not known from the published advertisements. It also appears that some of the Northwood items may have had mold changes though the general shape and size of the pieces remained the same. Hopefully, as we see more pieces, we may be able to sort out the company listings and match them to actual pieces. It's all part of the excitement of glass research and discovery.

Currently, the way that we confirm that we have a Northwood piece is by seeing it in the opaque blue or russet.

In the next newsletter, we hope to begin illustrating the Fenton Art Glass Company's "covered" pieces (i.e. perfumes, puffs, candy jars, etc.) Again, we have many of these but we'll have to rely on our fellow stretch glass collectors to supply some of the more unusual forms. We would love to see and illustrate the Fenton #844 candy bowl with flower top. If you have one please bring it to the Chicago

convention.

Since we didn't hear from a single member concerning the naming of stretch colors, we can only conclude that this isn't a very "hot" topic. We still think that it will make our descriptions and studies more consistent. Berry Wiggins has spent considerable time researching the names for colors used by each of the nine manufacturers of stretch glass. We are still in the process of compiling this listing with descriptions. As with most such research there will always be some questions which remain unanswered.

We were extremely pleased to receive our copy of the "Dugan/Diamond, The Story of Indiana, Pennsylvania, Glass" book by Heacock, Measell and Wiggins. It certainly helps answer many of the questions of identity of Diamond Glass Ware stretch glass. If you don't have access to this book, you can request information from: Antique Publications, Box 553, Marietta, OH 45750. After reading the book, we see signs of Dugan/Diamond everywhere, and not just in stretch glass. It's always fun to be able to identify this glass for others!

About a month after receiving our book, we discovered one of the low, wide bowls in "Twilight Wisteria" (figure #606). We also recall seeing one of the "Barcelona line" vases in opaque pink located in one of Bill Crowl's private collection boxes (figure #602). At the time, we thought that it must surely be an experimental piece by Consolidated Art Glassware Co. (it looks like their Catalonian, Old Spanish Glassware line). Now we know better! As we learn more about these unusual pieces, we have to keep changing our "search image" of what stretch glass looks like!

Concerning our attempt to obtain an anniversary piece for our 20th Convention, Berry Wiggins has been very kind to negotiate with Mr. Frank Fenton and the Fenton Art Glass Company. We find it interesting and somewhat an insight into how glass companies operate. Fenton is willing to produce a twin dolphin fan vase, in RED STRETCH, which will be uniquely marked on the bottom. They will bring out the mold and do a trial run, scheduled for December. We

will then be shown the piece and confirm that it is what we are interested in. By doing the trial run, the company can determine what the correct cost will be and how much time will have to be scheduled to make the run. We are hoping to keep the cost within our original target by encouraging Fenton to make a larger run for general distribution which will not be uniquely marked as our anniversary piece. We could be blinded by our collecting enthusiasm, but we can imagine that thousands could be sold as they rotate in front of the QVC camera!

After we get the final cost, we will need to take orders from our members. We plan to have the form ready in our January newsletter. We have to do this because our limited budget can not afford to buy the entire run. We now appreciate some of the investments made by the carnival glass clubs!

With our business over, we would like to share with you information (i.e. brag?) on our new finds. We added two significant pieces to our russet collection. We discovered a tumbler to match our #559 Northwood bedroom jug at a local carnival glass auction. We had to fight off the carnival collectors, but we prevailed. We also located a covered almond (#691) at the Knight's Show in Springfield, OH. The couple from Kentucky sold it at a very reasonable price. At the same show, Dave found an unusual Northwood vase in opaque blue. It's illustrated in the current drawings. We still can't match it up with any catalog numbers.

When we went to the Tiffin Glass show, we found TWO pairs of the U.S. Glass #310 candle sticks, one in opaque green and one in opaque yellow. When we went to Michigan in August, we found another U.S. Glass #310 bowl in opaque green. We still haven't seen any U.S. Glass opaque pink (pink slag) or green slag pieces.

Renee was able to purchase three lovely NUART stretch shades in Imperial's pearl green at the above mentioned carnival auction (Dave had to go back to work after the purchase of the tumbler!).

Well, we hope to hear from you in the next months and happy collecting.

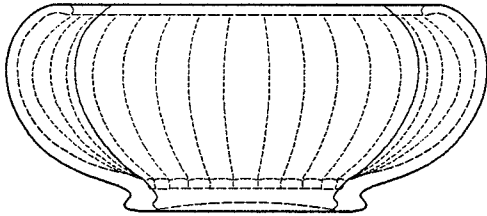

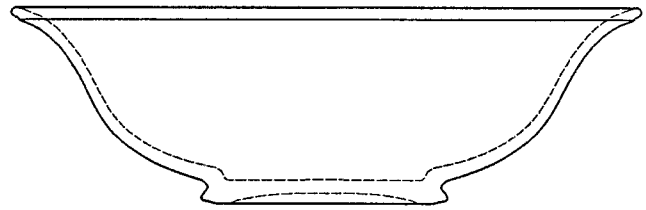
#616 fruit or flower bowl, 11"



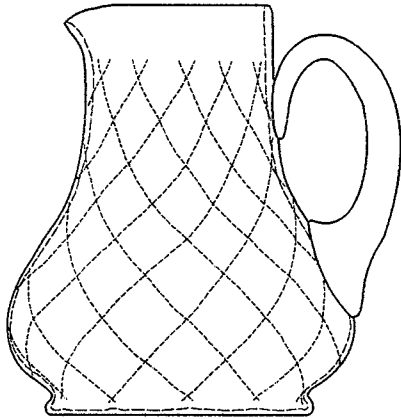
#301 bowl, 8" with 28 interior rays, 4 mold



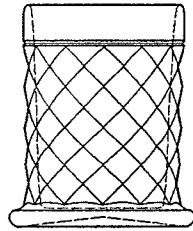
#617 bowl, 8.5" with 28 interior rays, 4 mold



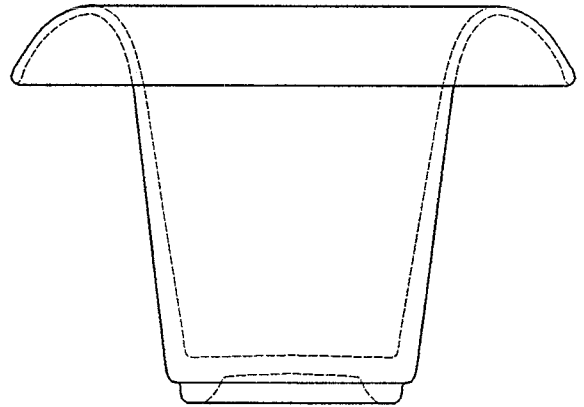
#660 bowl, 10" with 28 interior rays, 4 mold



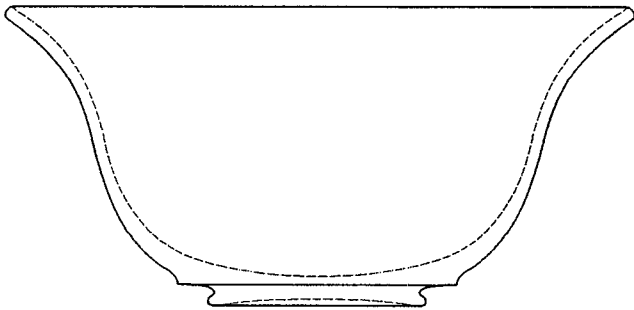
#559 bedroom jug



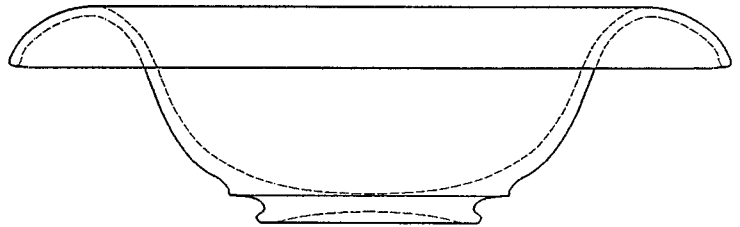
#559 bedroom
jug tumbler



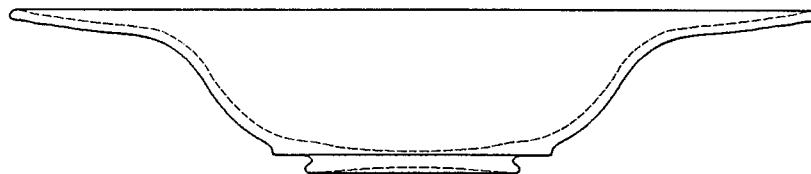
#??? tall vase with rolled rim, 6.25" tall, 9" wide



#647 fruit or flower bowl, 10.5"

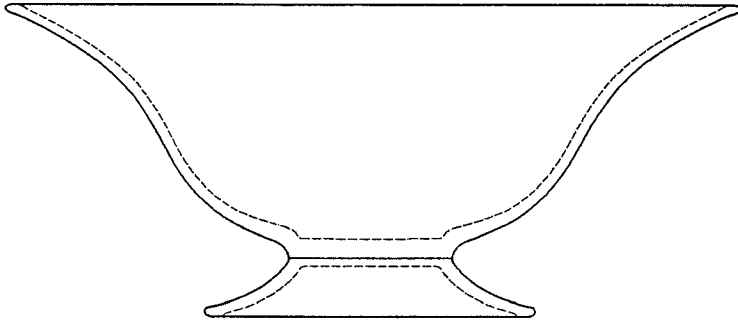


#649 fruit or flower bowl, 11.5"

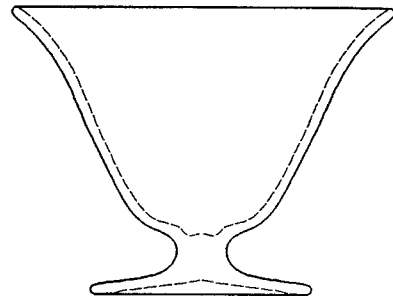


#648 fruit or flower bowl, 13"

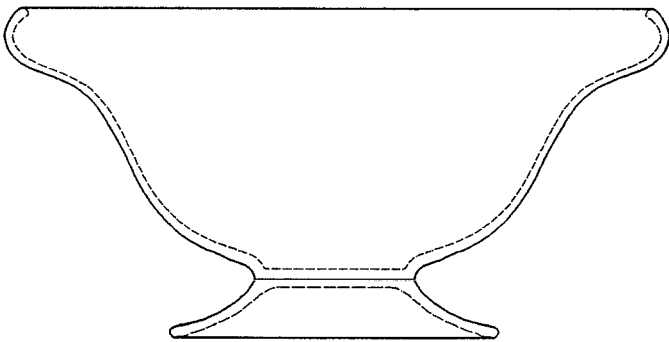

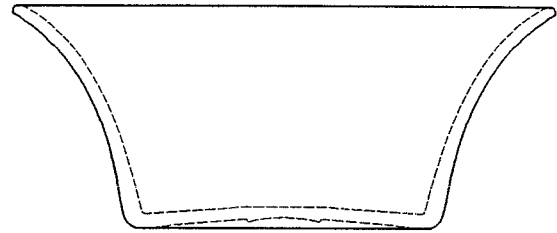
#677 footed bowl, 11.5"



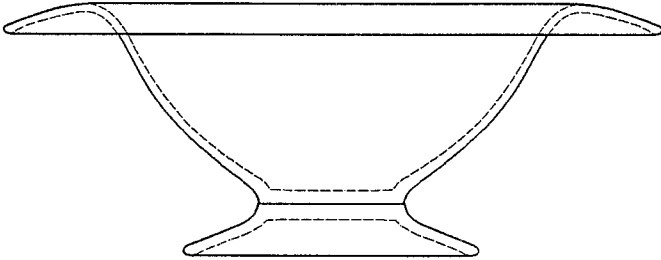
#704 mayonnaise (deep)



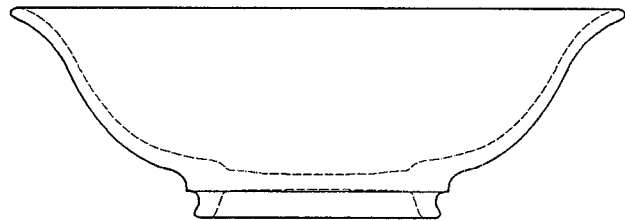
#679 footed bowl, 10.5"



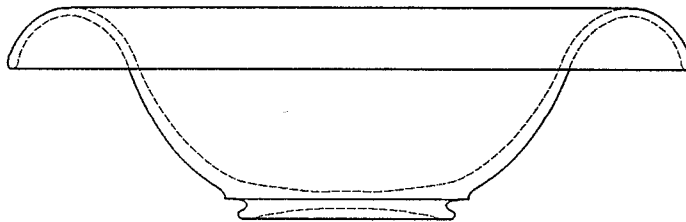
#669 bowl, 8" with ground marie on base

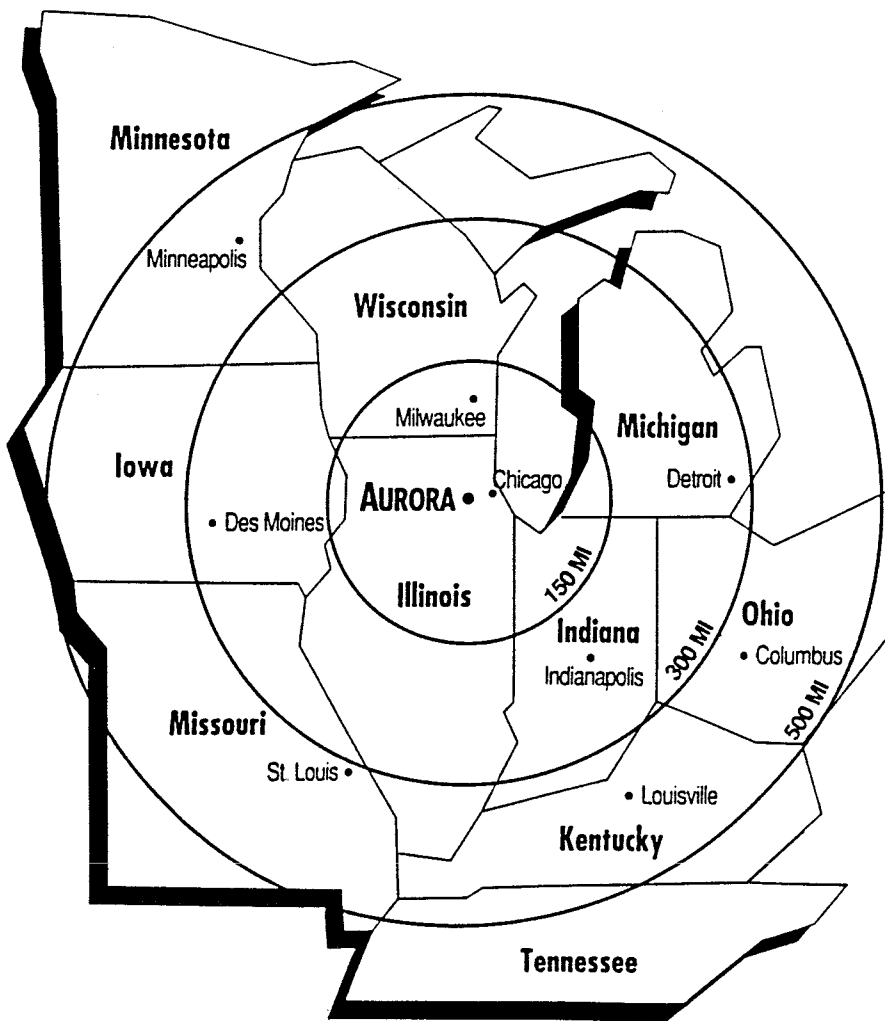

I received the following from the Umbracos:

The 1993 Stretch Glass Convention reviews have been wonderful. When they perfect "cloning" we certainly will be first in line! From the newsletter it sounds like a number of positive steps were taken to promote Stretch Glass such as the color listing.

We have had a lot of Stretch Glass company this past summer most notably, John Madeley and Jean and Tom Bucher. We also opened our home to a new collectors group out of Vacaville, CA; and to my Pen-women's group. The different types of questions that each person has about the Stretch Glass certainly can keep you on your "toes". I am always pleasantly surprised by the non-stretch glass collectors and how they appreciate what advanced collectors consider the "common" bowls.

John Madeley was out for the weekend photographing Stretch Glass. It was a lot of fun. Had really forgotten the drama and excitement of putting a single piece on a light table with the spotlight on the one piece. Each piece has its own personality which is many times lost in a cabinet full of glass. During the weekend we kept him busy looking at a number of collections. We see our friends and their glass all the time but by showing the glass off to John, we were able to capture the excitement that we had when the piece was first found. Also was interested in hearing from John what he has seen before and hasn't seen. He certainly is a good spokesperson for the SGS and the SGS convention.

We were very pleased that a dear friend found for us the pedestal fruit bowl in velva rose. Rather than a fruit bowl the sides are turned down into a banana bowl shape. Fenton Book 1 KU#350. It is one big piece of glass and am having trouble finding the right spot for it. No John didn't see it. John hadn't heard the story on the wisteria fruit bowl like we have pictured in our book so maybe others haven't heard it either. Frank Fenton told us his story about the bowl a good twenty years ago, so Frank may have to correct some of the details. Frank's aunt had a similar bowl and when she passed away, the only fair thing to do was to auction her glass off and have the proceeds go to the family. Frank just loved the bowl, but he had to go to a meeting or something so he asked his wife to bid on it for him. Also another relative (son, I think) was at the auction. Frank got out of the meeting early and didn't see his wife or son at the auction, to make a long story short, the three were bidding against each other and Frank finally paid I believe \$250 for the bowl! That bowl made headlines in all the collectors newsletters and magazines. Really believe that is what launched Stretch Glass Collecting. It is a beautiful bowl and we don't see them in the West.

All of the SGS officers deserve a big THANK YOU for all of your hard work towards promoting Stretch Glass. Happy Stretch Glass hunting.
