Sandy and Mary Elda do not do this alone, there are other volunteers assisting them. We are a team!

Please consider volunteering to be a candidate for one of the open positions in 2022. We need your enthusiasm and talents to help us to continue to spread the word about stretch glass. Please take a look at the following descriptions of these positions and then reach out to Cal Hackeman (cal@calhackeman.com or 919 600-4533) or Vickie Rowe (pvrnurse@gmail.com or (978) 894-4526) to volunteer for the position which best fits with your talents and interests. Thank you, in advance.

Secretary – participates in quarterly Board of Directors meetings via zoom, records actions of the Board and provides minutes of the meetings, sends get well, sympathy, etc. cards to members, notifies members via email of upcoming events (Stretch Out Discussions, etc.), distributes via email Stretch Glass Reviews and performs such other duties as requested by the Co-Presidents. The current Secretary estimates she devotes approximately 20 hours per quarter to these activities.

Treasurer – maintains the financial records of the organization, receives and deposits all incoming funds and pays all amounts due via check, provides quarterly financial reports to the board of directors, assists with preparation of Annual Action Plan and Budget, provides information on new members to Membership Administrator, provides information on convention registrations to Convention chair, performs such other duties as requested by Co-Presidents. Participates in Quarterly Board of Director meetings via Zoom. The current Treasurer estimates he devotes approximately 16 hours per quarter to these activities.

Director – Advertising and Promotion – Formulates and brings about advertising and promotion of stretch glass, The Stretch Glass Society and SGS events, collaborates with third party ad creators, as needed. Participates in Quarterly Board of Director meetings via Zoom. This position is currently vacant.

Director – Newsletter – Oversees the collection and editing of articles, photos, and other information to be included in each issue of the Quarterly and writes articles, as needed. This information is provided to the Editor, who prepares and distributes the Quarterly. Collaborates with Co-Presidents regarding the desired topics to be covered in the Quarterly, and with those who are identified to provide articles. Participates in Quarterly Board of Director meetings via Zoom. The current Director – Newsletter estimates she devotes approximately 20 hours per quarter to these activities.

Director – Social Media -Oversees The Stretch Glass Society's presence on social media including Facebook, our website, Instagram and other outlets. He collaborates with our Webmaster on website design, content and updates and participates in Quarterly Board of Director meetings via Zoom. The current Director – Social Media estimates he devotes approximately 12-15 hours per quarter to these activities.

Director – Stretch Out Discussions – Organizes 5 stretch out discussions per year, 2 of the discussions are Show and Tell only while 3 out of the 5 discussions are recorded and formatted into Stretch Glass Reviews. Prepares announcements of upcoming Stretch Out Discussions and sends announcements to other glass clubs and organizations. Collaborates with others who prepare photo albums for each discussion, collaborates with Secretary to promote the Discussions and to distribute Stretch Glass Reviews. Records and transcribes discussions and collaborates with others who edit the transcripts into Stretch Glass Reviews. Participates in Quarterly Board of Directors meetings via Zoom. The current Director-Stretch Out Discussions estimates she devotes approximately 30 hours per quarter to these activities.

Director – Souvenirs – Oversees the inventory of past souvenirs owned by The SGS; proposes possible sales of past souvenirs, investigates possible souvenirs for 50th anniversary celebration and if it is decided to have a souvenir made will oversee the production, sale and distribution of the souvenir, participates in Quarterly Board of Directors meetings via Zoom. This position is currently vacant.

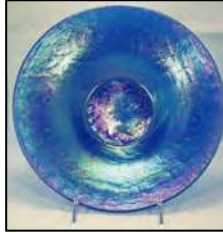

CONVENTION DISPLAY

Please contact Dave and Renee at ohiobugdoc@gmail.com or rshetlar@gmail.com to let them know which pieces of glass you will be bringing for the convention display table. There are many examples of this color pictured in *American Iridescent Stretch Glass* – once you look at the photos you will realize that you have some of this stretch glass to share! Jeannette and Lancaster were the only two companies who did not produce amethyst stretch glass. Feel free to bring glass made by Fenton during the late period of stretch glass production.

5' ROUND DISPLAY TABLE

A member may display both stretch glass and non-stretch glass on a 5' round display table; however, the majority of the items displayed will be stretch glass. A white table cover will be provided. Please consider including informative text regarding the stretch glass items on your table to enhance the educational experience of all in attendance.

Each member is limited to one 5' round table.

FAVORITE ITEM

You may select a single item (or set) from your stretch glass which is your favorite item. "Favorite" status may be the result of the color, shape, size, from whom the item was acquired, how it was acquired, etc. You determine why it is your favorite item. You may include a short text sharing why the item is your favorite item.

Pretty in Purple!? Stretch Glass That Is!

Since our Stretch Glass Society club display theme this year is Purple Stretch, I thought I would try and get your stretch glass “juices” flowing for our convention! Stretch glass purples run from very light to almost black and some “purples” made by Fenton and Northwood have a definite bluish tone. Manganese dioxide is the most common mineral used to make purple glass, but cobalt oxide and nickel oxide can produce blue-purple and violets.

Most of the companies that made stretch glass made some purples except for Lancaster. Central produced their standard bowl and smaller candleholders in a purple (Fig. 1) which is a nice, deep color. None of their purple stretch is easy to find. Diamond made an array of purples, or at least, they used three names – Amethyst, Midnight Wisteria and Twilight Wisteria (Figs. 2, 3, 6, 7). My thoughts are that their Amethyst is probably the same or very close to the Twilight Wisteria which is a lighter purple (Figs., 3 & 6). The Midnight Wisteria is definitely a very dark purple and you have to hold up such an item to the light to see the purple color.

Fenton made the most purple glass that was called Wistaria (notice the a after the t). The origin of this name was researched by Stephanie Bennett and that discussion is found elsewhere in this newsletter. However, like all colored glass made a century ago, the colorants added to the glass could vary. This means that each batch may be a little different. For Fenton, their Wistaria could vary from being a very pale purple (Fig. 8) to a deep purple (Fig. 11). I’ve included a range of items that Fenton made in their Wistaria – Fig. 4, #55 cologne; Fig. 5, #56 cologne; Fig. 8, #318 candleholders; Fig. 10, #550 bowl, flared, cupped; Fig. 11, #604 bowl, flared, cupped; Fig. 12, pin holder; Fig. 13, #349 candleholders with cut ovals; Fig. 15, #847 rose bowl; Fig. 16, #649 candleholders; Fig. 17, #1602 twin-dolphin comport; Fig. 18, #249 candleholders; and, Fig. 33, #643 salver. Fenton also made very few of their melon rib vases in a bluish-purple glass which we believe was called Violet at the time (Fig. 19).

Imperial made some purple stretch glass in both their Art Glass Line (aka, Jewels) as well as in their regular stretch line. In the Art Glass Line, they produced Pearl Amethyst (Fig. 9) which has a multi-colored iridescence on a medium purple glass, and Pearl Silver (Fig. 14) which usually has a shiny, silvery surface which was applied to a darker purple glass. In their regular line, Imperial used the name Amethyst Ice. This color is most commonly seen in their wide panel bowls (Fig. 21), plates and sherbets (not shown). We also see this color in their candlestick bowl (Fig. 20). While Jeannette is most famous for their great marigold stretch items, they also made their three-ring based, footed bowls in a dark purple (Fig. 22). We believe that their name for this was simply, Purple.

Northwood seems to have experimented with purple stretch, but the only name known is Royal Purple which is a nice light purple with some blue overtones – Fig. 24, blown-molded, rib optic vase; Fig 25, square base, Tree-of-Life bowl with JIP top; Fig. 27, large rib optic vase crimped top. A few dark purple pieces are known (Fig. 23, square base bowl with no Tree-of-life pattern, square). U.S. Glass also made some stretch glass in purple and most of the items are in their #314 line – Fig. 28, candy jar with cover; Fig. 29, high-footed comport; and, Fig. 30 mayonnaise. However, I’ve seen their #179 handled server in purple (Fig. 26). Finally, Vineland made purple stretch (Fig. 31, 11-inch wide bowl) and we know that they called it Wisteria because of a label found on one of the bowls (Fig. 32)! Vineland’s purple stretch can range from a fairly light purple to a very dark purple.

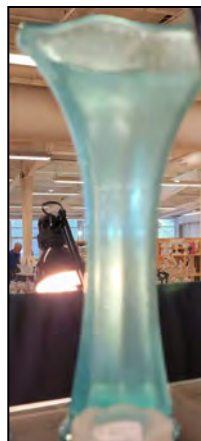

Wisteria or Wistaria? A Deeper Dive

In December 2018, Kirk Nelson, Director of the New Bedford Museum of Glass, gave a presentation on Neodymium Glass to the Founders Chapter of the American National Glass Club. Fascinating, but what particularly sparked my interest was a Tiffin advertisement for ‘Wistaria’ glass. I emailed Kirk, copying Cal, asking for the ad and wondering why both Fenton and Tiffin used this spelling. Cal wrote a short article for the March 2019 Quarterly noting Fenton used the “Wistaria” spelling before Tiffin, and either spelling is correct.

I’d already Googled Wisteria’s taxonomy and found this: “The botanist Thomas Nuttall said he named the genus *Wisteria* in memory of Dr. Caspar Wistar (1761–1818). Questioned about the spelling later, Nuttall said it was for "euphony," but his biographer speculated that it may have something to do with Nuttall's friend Charles Jones Wister, Sr., of Grumblethorpe, the grandson of the merchant John Wister. Some Philadelphia sources state that the plant is named after Wister. As the spelling is apparently deliberate, there is no justification for changing the genus name under the International Code of Botanical Nomenclature. However, some spell the plant's common name "wistaria", and Fowler (*Fowler's Dictionary of Modern English Usage*) is decisively for the "wistaria" spelling.”

The name Caspar Wistar rang a bell, so I looked backwards thru John Rowe’s five glass history articles. In his third article, “The In-between Years” in the May 2015 Quarterly, I found Caspar Wistar. He built a glass factory in Salem County, New Jersey that operated from 1739 until the Revolution. Then I was really intrigued, but very busy.

Fast-forward to March 2022. This year’s convention is near Philadelphia and the club display is the color Amethyst. OK, time to dive into that Wisteria taxonomy. I found this 22-page article online: “THE WISTAR-WISTER FAMILY: A Pennsylvania Family's Contributions Toward American Cultural Development” by Milton Rubicam, and learned: Caspar Wistar first, followed by his brother John, both emigrated from Germany, where their surname was Wuster. Caspar was naturalized as Wistar and John as Wister in 1740. But “18th century documents used the names interchangeably for both senior and junior family lines.” They also shared and repeated first names across the lines and down the generations, and there are several Srs, Jrs, and Drs. After agonizing re-reading, I determined: Dr. Caspar Wistar was the glassmaker’s grandson, more famous during Nuttall’s time in Philadelphia, but not so much a contemporary as the somewhat younger Charles Jones Wister, Sr.

I also read the article Kirk cited in his presentation, “NEO-WHATSIS GLASS?” by Judith Van Buskirk-Gugudan. It begins: “In order to find this glass that I love, I have had to ask dealers this try-and-take-a-breath-in-here-somewhere question. Do you have any of that glass which looks lavender in daylight or in incandescent light and then turns to a pale blue color in fluorescent lighting, and it is or was referred to . . . as Wisteria by The Fostoria Glass Company; as Twilight (but not Twilite nor Wistaria) by Tiffin Glass Company . . . as Wisteria by Fenton Art Glass Company, but only that made in 1977 and 1978 . . .” Her question goes on, giving the names used by many glass companies for their neodymium glass.

She gives Fenton details in Part II: “Fenton produced a Wisteria in 1977 and 1978 which contained neodymium oxide. There were ten items offered in the color.” (None she lists are stretch glass.) “Fenton’s Wisteria has only a subtle change of color, not the dramatic shift of the other companies’ colors covered herein. A copy of a page from the January 1977 Fenton catalog, which features this glass, can be found on Page 100 of the book, Fenton Glass, The Third Twenty-Five Years, by William Heacock. Both Mr. Bill Fenton and Mr. Frank Fenton were kind enough to speak with me by phone. Mr. Frank Fenton remembered the line and the neodymium oxide usage clearly. Speaking with him was a wonderful, educational experience for me.”

My random closing thoughts:

- I assume the colors Wistaria/Wisteria come from the genus Wisteria, named for the confusing Wistar-Wister family.
- Without Frank Fenton to ask, and with no evidence, I think Fenton and Tiffin used the color name Wistaria in honor of Caspar Wistar.

- Search for ‘Wistaria glass’ on eBay and you’ll find Tiffin’s Wistaria, often also called ‘pink.’
- Sarah tells us Fenton’s ‘Lavender Satin’ also changes color under fluorescent light.
- In an article titled “Grumblethorpe: Philadelphia’s Seriously Haunted Historic Home,” I learned the Wister mansion at 5267 Germantown Ave. is restored and open to the public. It’s haunted by a British general who died there during the Battle of Germantown. His bloodstain is still visible on the floor, and his presence revealed by a back mist rising from the spot and the sound of moaning. The spirit of Wisters’ house manager Justina also appears regularly. She’s friendly and usually appears on Friday evening after sunset, accompanied by the smell of baking bread. Perhaps a post-auction excursion?
- The annual Wistaria Festival in Sierra Madre, CA was celebrated on Sunday, March 27th 2022.
- Here’s a picture of my Wisteria frutescens ‘Amethyst Falls’ last June.

Its ‘arms’ are outstretched as if to give you a big hug. One of the appendages is unfinished (or damaged, you be the judge) on the end, but that just adds more uniqueness to “it.” Will you be the lucky bidder to take this unique creation from Fenton home with you from our 2022 convention? Burns Auction Service will offer this item live at the Friday night stretch glass auction. You may also bid absentee or by phone by contacting Tom or Debra in advance of the auction. Stretch Glass is Out There – You Just Have to Hunt for It!

Have you been out hunting stretch glass lately? If so, hopefully you have been able to find something for your collection. The Matthew Wroda stretch glass auction on May 13th had lots of great stretch glass as did the Eastern National Antique Show on May 6th and 7th. The Brimfield Antique Shows (17 of them to be exact) held May 10th through May 14th also had some stretch glass for sale. If you visit enough antique shops and malls, you will eventually find some stretch glass, although it is not abundant in most of the shops or malls. One ‘big’ recent find was the Fenton Late Period Topaz Opal 9pc punch set, found at Renninger’s outdoor antique market. I have not seen one of these for sale in years, so I was happy to be able to acquire it. A few weeks later I saw another set for sale in an antique mall – what a coincidence to see two of them in the same month. Pictured below are some of my recent sightings and purchases.

- 1) Diamond crystal “crackle” vase
- 2) Diamond green cheese & cracker
- 3) Fenton Florentine Green relish (now I need the underplate)
- 4) Fenton Late Period marigold diamond quilted comport
- 5) Fenton Late Period Velva Rose creamer (note the pressed glass pattern and the violet glass around the top edge)
- 6) Fenton Late Period Topaz Opal 9 pc punch set (note the all over pressed pattern)
- 7) Fenton Royal Blue bowl with rolled edge (this one has some damage on the rolled edge, but I’m just thrilled to have an example)
- 8) Imperial Blue Ice candleholders – these are not often seen in this shape
- 9) Imperial Marigold candleholders – these are also not often seen in the shape
- 10) Imperial Rose Ice mayo and underplate
- 11) Lancaster marigold vase with rolled edge – this is the usual larger size
- 12) Lancaster (I think) marigold vase with rolled edge and wheel cutting – this one is less than half the size of the usual size
- 13) Northwood Topaz bowl with an usual painted design
- 14) US Glass Topaz footed punch bowl
- 15) US Glass Topaz with black edge cupped bowl – this is the smaller one with a wide base

Yes, there is stretch glass out there if you are willing to hunt for it! Please share some of your finds and sightings for the next Quarterly.

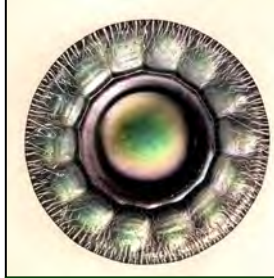

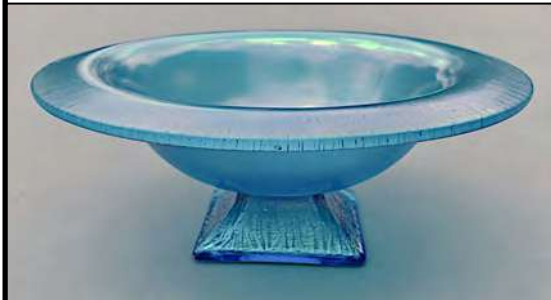
