

* Director of the SGS <u>Quarterly</u> newsletter - this volunteer determines the desired articles to be included in the SGS <u>Quarterly</u>, contacts the appropriate persons to request they write the articles, reviews articles submitted and provides the articles to our Newsletter Editor. The Editor prepares the SGS <u>Quarterly</u> and provides it to the contributors and the Board of Directors for review before it is published by the Editor. The Director does not have to know anything about layout, formatting, printing, etc. These are all handled by our Editor.

* Secretary - The Secretary takes minutes at meetings of the Society, conducts limited correspondence of the Society and keeps records of the Society as a whole under the supervision of the President.

None of these positions is expected to consume significant time and effort by the elected volunteer. This is not a full-time job; it is not even a part-time job! It is an opportunity to give back to your fellow members and to contribute to our on-going efforts to promote and preserve stretch glass. Please consider volunteering for one of these positions. You will be joining a team of stretch glass enthusiasts who enjoy what they do and have fun doing it. Without you - actually at least two of you - we will not be able to continue to effectively promote and preserve stretch glass or offer all of our members a first class <u>Quarterly</u> newsletter, an Annual Convention, and a host of other benefits which together are increasing the recognition and appreciation of stretch glass which, in turn, makes sure that stretch glass will not be a forgotten art in the future and that it maintains or increases in value for when you wish to sell your collection – something that is inevitable for all of us. Thank you for your consideration of these opportunities. We

look forward to hearing from you before July 1, 2023, so that we can announce the candidates for Officers and Directors prior to our Annual Meeting in August at Convention.

Stretch Glass Beverage Sets and Drinking Vessels Primer for Our 2023 Club Display

Our club display this year will feature all the forms of pitchers, tumblers, cups and saucers that were made in stretch glass. It should be quite a display if we can accumulate all the forms in all the known colors. To get your interest going, I'll cover many of the items that will be on display and I request that you send me a note if you think you have a rare color or form and you are willing to bring the

piece or have someone else bring it. While we will have some full displays of complete pitcher and tumbler sets, for the display, only one tumbler will be needed with each pitcher in order to save some space and reduce your packing!

First off is Diamond. Diamond made three primary pitchers. The Adam's Rib (#900, Fig. 1) pitcher and handled tumblers come in blue and green. The pitcher is blown-molded with an applied handle. Diamond also used a corset-shaped vase to make tall pitchers (Figs. 2 & 3, Topaz and Blue Crackle), but I've not seen matching tumblers. Notice the unique shape of the handles. They take a sharp turn up from the base of the handle, then another sharp turn down at the top. If you see this shape of handle, you can rightly guess it is Diamond. These vases are very difficult to find and, after blowing, they were stuck onto a punty rod for finishing. This means that they will have a rough ground pontil mark. Diamond also made a rib-optic pitcher that is matched with exterior-ribbed tumblers (Fig. 4, green). The pitcher should have a cover. This is fairly obtainable in blue and green, but I know of a marigold example. The final pitcher appears to be a ball-shaped one that has pinches (Fig. 7, marigold). (Pinching of vases was common with Diamond.) The little corset-shaped tumblers match perfectly. Diamond also made a

handled mug (Fig. 5, blue), and an extremely rare cup with a set of rings at the top (Fig, 6, crystal). I know of some plates that have these rings. I figure that Diamond may have started making a line of stretch with these rings, but the factory closed before many were made. This cup is figured in the stretch glass book, crimped to form a creamer (AISG, Fig. 72). Diamond also made a high-stemmed goblet (Fig. 8, blue) which is difficult to find, and I've seen them in blue, green and crystal.

Fenton produced the widest array of beverage sets and drinking vessels! In fact, they made so many, I didn't have space to show the #401 night sets (tumble-ups) (photo #1) or the #215 cocktail/juice set (photo #2). I'll start with the guest set #200 (Fig. 9, Tangerine). This set comes in all the primary stretch colors except for Ruby and Royal Blue (cobalt). What makes collecting these interesting is that the handle colors often differ. Most will have cobalt blue handles, but the handles can be made from the same glass color as the jug or crystal.

Fenton made a barrel-shaped pitcher with barrel-shaped tumblers (Fig. 10, blue). This set comes in blue and green, but there may be others out there. Notice that this pitcher is quite similar to the Diamond one (Fig. 7) except the handles are very different. The most obtainable Fenton beverage sets are the #220 (Fig. 13, Topaz with cobalt handles) and the #222 Fig. 14, Velva Rose) sets. These are most obtainable in Celeste Blue and Topaz, but Wisteria and Crystal sets are known. Notice that the #220 tumblers flare out and the #222 tumblers are corset shaped. Apparently, the tumblers were interchanged, so you might find a set with a #220 pitcher with #222 tumblers. The complete set came with a pitcher with underplate or stand (the underplate is very difficult to find) and six tumblers, each with a coaster. The coasters have become more expensive than the tumblers in recent years! The #222 tumblers may have applied handles, or, less commonly, without handles. Fenton made three sizes of "ringbase" vases and they made pitchers from these (Figs. 15 & 16, Topaz Opalescent, rib optic and curtain optic). The larger pitchers came with taller ring-based tumblers, but the small pitcher (not shown) came with a smaller tumbler (Fig. 12, Topaz Opalescent, rib optic).

Fenton also made a considerable number of tea cups in stretch colors, one plain (Fig. 17, Florentine Green) and one with the #1502 (diamond optic) interior (Fig. 18, Tangerine). There are matching plates for these tea cups (not shown). Fenton also made a punch cup (Fig. 19, Celeste Blue) which is very difficult to obtain. These come in Celeste Blue, Florentine Green and Persian Pearl. I know of two Ruby ones! A few years ago, a Fenton club member came in with a Lincoln Inn cup in Persian Pearl (Fig. 20). It's the only one that I know of, but there had to have been a set made originally! Where are they?? The #1502 diamond optic stemmed tumbler (Fig. 21, Velva Rose) and goblet (Fig. 22, Velva Rose) are also extremely rare, but again, a Fenton club member mentioned to me that she had a set of six! I've never heard from her again! I debated as to whether to include the Fenton shaving mug (Fig. 11) since one really wouldn't drink from it! But here it is! It is only known in Celeste Blue and Topaz, and none are easy to obtain.

Northwood made three sets of pitcher/tumbler sets (according to their catalog pages), but I've never seen the so-called Barbella pitcher in person (a person posted a picture of the ribbed-optic pitcher on Hooked-on-Carnival a couple of years go). The tumblers are known in Topaz and Russet (Fig. 24). None are common and command high prices. I had seen several of the Barbella handled tumblers without iridescence, but I found one last year sitting by itself on a mall shelf (Fig. 23, Blue). Northwood's night set, #559 (Fig. 25, Jade Blue) is often called "quilted optic" or "diamond optic") and is fairly obtainable in Blue, Topaz and Russet. Northwood also made a tall, quilted optic beverage set (Fig. 28, Blue). The pitcher has a lid, and the set originally came with coasters for the tumblers, but no stand or cup for the pitcher (at least, that I've ever seen). This is most commonly found in Blue, rarely in Topaz, and I know of one Russet pitcher and three tumblers.

Finally, we come to Imperial's sets. I'm surprised that Imperial only made their #600 (Chesterfield) pitchers, tumblers, and handled mugs in stretch! They were a giant company that made lots of other pitchers and tumblers. The #600 pitcher and tumbler sets (Fig. 26, Iris Ice) are known in Rose Ice (marigold), Ruby Ice, Green Ice (teal), and Iris Ice (crystal). None are common and the tumblers are highly prized by tumbler collectors. I've also included an example of the Rose Ice pitcher with cover and a handled mug (Fig. 27). The handled mug is also found in Iris Ice.

The Eastern National Antique Show was held in Carlisle, PA, on May 5 & 6, 2023. As usual, there were several dealers there who offered stretch glass for sale. The Stretch Glass Society exhibited a portion of The Bill Crowl Stretch Glass Collection and handed out materials about our upcoming convention as well as membership brochures. Bob Henkel and Billy



Shreck arranged our stretch glass on a table and shelves and greeted folks as they stopped by to admire our beautiful iridescent stretch glass. We gained one new member at the show, Juan LeBron, a local dealer who sells glass in the Pine Hills Antique Mall in Adamstown. He is very excited about learning more about stretch glass and has alerted his picker to be on the lookout for stretch glass, so we
