Happy collecting and we hope you find some treasures!



Imperial Ice By Cal Hackeman


It is March and it should be cold and icey for most of us. The folks on Hooked on Carnival (and Stretch) were having an "ICE" month, so I shared the Imperial Ice Stretch Glass with them and now I'm sharing it with you. Spring is just around the corner, so enjoy the ice as long as you can.

Imperial was the only one of the stretch glass companies to actually use the word 'ice' in the names of their colors and they were very consistent, using it to describe 7 colors. Let's start with a color

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which is not frequently found: Amber Ice. I'm aware of a couple of serving bowls, a swung vase, sherbets, and both luncheon and sherbet plates known in this color. Twenty years ago it was considered much rarer than it is today because over time more pieces have been found. Here is an example.







My favorite pieces of Amethyst Ice are this sherbet and underplate. Again, this is not a color which is easily found, especially in sherbets. There are also luncheon plates, swung vases and serving bowls known.

This vase in Blue Ice is the ultimate example of stretch glass. I suppose one might say it looks like ice as it is cracking; however you want to look at it, it is pretty cool.

Green Ice is so very different from Blue Ice that it is hard to believe they are siblings. This Green Ice comport is among my favorites in this color.

Iris Ice varies from being very Icey and stretchy to being relatively smooth and satiny. This vase is a great example in more ways than one as it is among the tallest and largest swung vases in my col-



Rose Ice

Rose Ice is a color I always have trouble with. There are other Imperial colors such as Pink Marigold, which are very close in color. Rose Ice is best represented by this vase which has a similar texture as the Blue Ice one mentioned above.

Last, but certainly not least, is Ruby Ice, often referred to as ruby or red or even amberina. According to an Imperial catalogue of the period, the color is Ruby Ice, and this is a good example of the color and the finish. Six of the pieces of this water set have been together since before they were purchased in a house in New England many years ago. Apparently, the owners at that time were missing one tumbler because the set only had the pitcher and 5 tumblers. Phil & Nancy Waln added the sixth tumbler and did an amazing job of matching the iridescence and color so that it is impossible to tell which tumbler was added.

an auction of stretch glass and are also the sponsors of our 50th anniversary banquet. Promoting The Stretch Glass Society and American stretch glass has begun and





All are welcome to join this Zoom meeting Come share your BIG and small favorites or new acquisitions.





Stretch Glass "Gold!" Celebrating the Stretch Glass Society 50th Anniversary, Part 1.

Our Stretch Glass Society has survived and is thriving after 50 years of existence! As part of our annual convention, we will be celebrating our anniversary with our display of "gold" stretch glass. While many pieces of stretch glass have been decorated with gold enamel accents, we are talking about marigold. It appears that six of the nine stretch glass manufacturers included some form of marigold pieces in their stretch glass lines. I don't know of any marigold stretch glass pieces made by Central, U.S. Glass or Vineland. Before our convention, I want to give you a preview of what might show up for the club display. In this article I'll show some of the pieces made by Diamond and Fenton. I find it interesting that Diamond and Fenton's marigold pieces have subtle to no stretch effect in the iridescence, but since they included the pieces in their stretch glass lines, we include them. Remember that what we call marigold today is generally the result of spraying (doping) the glass with a solution containing iron sulfate salts. Apparently, it was a very unpopular dope because sulfuric acid would come off the sprayed surface. This would irritate the worker's eyes and eat away at the equipment.

Diamond apparently used the term "Gold" to refer to the marigold pieces in their Rainbow Lustre line and this color is not extremely common like Fenton's Grecian Gold pieces. I'll start with Diamond's candleholders. The "Mae West" trumpet-shaped candleholders (Fig. 1) are quite common in blue and green, but Gold examples are less common but obtainable which is the same case for the spindle-shaped holders (Fig. 2). The blown-molded candleholders/bud vases (Fig. 3) in the 9.5" form and the 7" form (not shown) are also known but the Adam's Rib (#900) version (Fig. 9) is very difficult to find. I know of only one set of the "Pastel Panels" pitcher and tumbler sets (Fig. 4) which are also most commonly seen in blue and green. Comports are very uncommon in Gold (Fig. 5) and I have only seen two of the Adam's Rib comports in Gold (Fig. 11). Two marigold stands are known, and Cal discovered a punch bowl that fits perfectly on one of the stands (Fig. 6). A couple of candlebowls (Fig. 7) are known in Gold and car vases (Fig. 8), marked Benzer, are fairly obtainable. Gold plates (Fig. 12) are very rare and the "crinkle" vases (Fig. 10) are known in the corset and pinched forms. I didn't have space to show a Diamond heart-handled server in Gold, but a couple are known. Finally, the typical Diamond sherbet (Fig. 13) is known but the one figured has a flower cutting decoration. Notice that I haven't included any Diamond bowls other than the fish bowl. The most common one is a large (12 inch) flared bowl with a ground base. Those rarely have strong gold iridescence and usually have good stretch effect.

Fenton Art Glass company made a great amount of marigold stretch glass which they called Grecian Gold. Unfortunately, very little of this has strong stretch effect. Most is shiny to satiny. The first example does have excellent stretch effect (Fig. 15). I've seen two of these bowls and they appear to be the Fenton #2005 bowl that has a 3 3/8-inch base with no collar. This bowl is also known in Royal Blue! Almost any Fenton bowl can be found in Grecian Gold and the iridescence can range from a pale marigold [e.g., #603 cupped bowl with matchstick cutting (Fig. 16), #604 punch bowl (Fig. 21) and #109 rose bowl (Fig. 17)] to a deep orangish marigold [e.g., #231 low bowl (Fig. 14), #604 low bowl (Fig. 21), #857 "melon rib" cupped bowl (Fig. 26), #847 "melon rib" low bowl (Fig. 28), "5-rings" bowl, crimped (Fig. 29), and #647 flared-cupped bowl with cut oval decoration (Fig. 35)]. The #9 candy jar (Fig. 22) is most commonly found with grape or floral cuttings. The #643 covered bonbon (Fig. 18) is quite obtainable, but the ribbed #943 covered bonbon (Fig. 23) is not common in any color (this one has the silver leaf decoration on the lid). The most difficult covered jar would be the #857 bonbon with a floral-knob lid (Fig. 34). Comports in Grecian Gold are also obtainable, but I'll only show the #9 one with six crimps (Fig. 19) and the #250 "high-standard" with a flared-cupped top (Fig. 20). Many of the Fenton vases can be found in Grecian Gold, but the #400 square-top one (Fig. 24) has very dark iridescence, and I've only seen one of the 12-inch high #891 vase (Fig. 30). The #2 creamer and sugar set (Fig. 31) has deep iridescence set off by the applied cobalt blue handles. Most of the colognes and bath jars come in Grecian Gold. Shown here is a #56 ½ (flower top) cologne (Fig. 33) and the #17 bath jar (Fig. 27). The cigarette box (Fig. 25) also has a floral cutting with an acid-etched band around the lid margins. Notice the typical flared sherbet (Fig. 32) of Fenton compared to the Diamond one above. The Fenton one is on a specific sherbet plate that has an offset ring in which the base of the sherbet fits.

By now, you may have realized that I haven't included the various Fenton pitchers, tumblers and candleholders (except for the #349 ones in Fig. 35 that have cut oval decoration!), plates and servers. There are just too many pieces to illustrate in one discussion, so I'll try to cover them in another newsletter. All-in-all, single pieces of marigold stretch glass rarely get much attention, but when clustered together, like in the color page, they make a considerable impression of GOLD!



The Bill Crowl Memorial Education Fund and Stretch Glass Collection What are They, Why do They Exist and How Do They Benefit The SGS and Stretch Glass?

Bill Crowl was a Charter member of The Stretch Glass Society (SGS) in 1974. He was among a small group of individuals interested in both carnival and stretch glass who championed the idea of a collectors' club for stretch glass and he was present in Denver, PA, on April 21, 1974, when The SGS was formed. Bill had been involved in buying and selling coins earlier in his life, however, he decided to give up his coin shop after he was robbed and beaten at the shop. He turned his attention to buying and selling collectibles in a number of different categories including stretch glass. He traveled extensively buying stretch glass (and other items) at flea markets, auctions, etc. and selling them to collectors wherever he could find them – at conventions, at shows, even at their homes. He told me that he had driven over a million miles and was working on his second million. Bill amassed a for sale inventory of collectibles in his chosen fields and also had substantial collections which he would sometimes put on display for others to enjoy. Among his most famous collections were his red and Tangerine stretch glass. He also had collections of Velva Rose and Aquamarine stretch glass, but his red and Tangerine collections were his pride and joy. The Stretch Glass Soci-

ety benefited from his knowledge, traveling, buying, selling and sharing on a number of occasions when he provided rare and unusual stretch glass for our 'Club Displays' at annual conventions. He always had stretch glass for sale at our conventions – usually hundreds of pieces that he had picked up during his cross-country trips during the year. Many of us, myself included, owe much of our collections and knowledge of stretch glass to the efforts of Bill Crowl.



When Bill passed away in 2017, at the age of 82 years old, several members of The Stretch Glass Society proposed the establishment of The Bill Crowl Memorial Education Fund (BCMEF) to the Board of Directors along with donations which initially funded its creation. The BCMEF was established to honor Bill Crowl's many contributions to stretch glass collecting by undertaking activities to promote stretch glass and to provide educational opportunities for others to learn about stretch glass. The primary focus of the BCMEF to date has been to oversee the acquisition of a collection of stretch glass which is used in displays and presentations about stretch glass as we reach out to expand the knowledge of and interest in stretch glass among other collectors, especially other glass collectors. Prior to the BCMEF and the Bill Crowl Memorial Stretch Glass Collection (BCMSGC or the collection), SGS members who were sharing stretch glass in displays or giving presentations *(Continued on page 18)*

on stretch glass had to use stretch glass from their own collections. The BCMSGC is intended to alleviate the need for members to utilize their own stretch glass when doing outreach on behalf of The SGS. The items in the BCMSGC are also available to be loaned to museums or other facilities for temporary exhibits of stretch glass (2 -6 months).



The BCMEF and the BCMSGC are entirely funded by charitable donations from SGS members and others. The BCMEF was established within The Stretch Glass Society and so donations to it are tax deductible as are donations to The SGS according to the donor's personal tax attributes. Donations are acknowledged in The Quarterly and each donor receive a donor's letter at the end of each year acknowledging their contributions. The value of items (as opposed to monetary donations) is established by the donor and their tax advisors; The SGS does not place a value on donated items as this is prohibited by IRS regulations. The collection includes many pieces of stretch glass donated by SGS members as well as a number of items purchased with the funds donated to the BCMEF.

Today, the collection includes nearly 500 items including stretch glass, Fenton catalogs/catalog pages, books on stretch glass and photographs. While the collection includes many readily available examples of stretch glass, it has only a few hard-to-find or rare examples. In recent years, there has been a concerted effort to acquire additional "WOW" items to enhance the displays of stretch glass being presented utilizing the collection. Purchases are made on behalf of the BCMEF by Bob Henkel and me, acting jointly under authorization of the Board of Directors. When an item is identified as being of interest at an auction, we agree on a maximum price to be paid for the item and bids are executed until the item is won or the maximum price is exceeded, in which case the item is not acquired by the BCMEF for the collection.



A substantial portion of the collection is pictured in the 2024 SGS Calendar. While all of the items in the calendar are from the collection, except one item on the cover page, not all of the items in the collection are pictured in the calendar due to lack of space. Take a look at the calendar pages to see most of the stretch glass we have – and what we dont have. We are always looking to make acquisitions to enhance the collection. Additionally, new acquisitions, whether purchased or donated, are generally included in The Quarterly. If you would like to help us, as many SGS members have already done, enhance the collection, please consider making a donation of one or more pieces of stretch glass or a monetary donation. We thank the many members who included a donation to the BCMEF when they renewed their membership for 2024.

The Houston Glass Show was a great show. There were dealers from as far away as Iowa, South Carolina and New Jersey. Several members of The Stretch Glass Society were selling at the show including Bob & Helen Jones, Gary Lickver, David Kastor, Rita and Steve Ellwein and Ed Sawicki. The Promoter, Max Miller, was very inviting and happy to have a display of stretch glass. As I walked around the show I noticed



quite a bit of stretch glass for sale; I even purchased a couple pieces including a US Glass #310 pink comport with unusual flower decoration on it, a crystal Jeanette bowl with a collar base, a tall Diamond blue swung vase and a Northwood custard very large flared bowl.

The Show started with a preview on Friday night. Lots of folks came and there was a lot of interest in stretch glass. I passed out a lot of our information. Earlier in the day I walked around and offered each of the dealers at the show a copy of the 2024 Stretch Glass Calendar. Most enthusiastically accepted, so stretch glass will be gracing their walls in 2024. Saturday saw a large crowd at opening and a steady crowd of buyers all day. Joan and Pat Halliburton, David Kastor and Sandy and Bob Sage, who live in Texas, came by to say hi and check out our display. Again, there was lots of interest in stretch glass. Sunday night I left Houston and drove a few hours before stopping in Louisiana for the night. Monday included a stop to pick up purchases at Burns Auction Gallery in Mississippi and catch up with Tom for a few minutes. Then it was off to Alabama and more antique malls. All I found to buy was an early American Flint Glass etched bowl but I was starting to see more stretch glass in the malls. On Tuesday I found a Fenton late period violet shell bowl with 4 sides up. The price was excellent and that one went home with me. At the next mall I found a blue US Glass #310 footed bowl and an Imperial Ice flared serving bowl on a matching underplate; both of those got a ride to Pennsylvania as well. Wednesday I was in Georgia hitting antique malls every few miles but not finding any stretch glass to buy, however, there were pieces for sale, which was nice to see. Thursday I was back in Tennessee and made a few more purchases, unfortunately no stretch glass, but one Imperial comport with an unusual scalloped edge in Marigold did get into the truck. Friday, February 24, 2024, I was home by mid-day having logged 3,959 miles. A lot of folks now know about stretch glass; hopefully we have sparked some interest that will result in more purchases of stretch glass, whether to use or to collect or both. 

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
